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FY2025: A Step Toward A New Transformation

In 2025, conflicts and disasters continued to occur around the world, once again calling into question the foundations of people’s lives and livelihoods. In Japan, concerns about the rapid decline in the birthrate appear to have surpassed worries about our country being the world’s fastest-aging society. Because of that, we have realized that the challenge now is how to sustain and further develop better health, medical and welfare services in Japan and throughout the world. We have therefore strengthened and expanded our activities aimed at “Better Health and Dignity for All.”

Aiming to eliminate stigma and discrimination associated with leprosy around the world, we have steadily carried out activities in collaboration with Yohei Sasakawa, the WHO Goodwill Ambassador for Leprosy Elimination, who became Honorary Chair of The Nippon Foundation in June 2025. These activities are focused on countries where the disease continues to occur. In FY2025, we organized national conferences on leprosy in Nepal, Sri Lanka and Brazil, emphasizing the need for measures against the disease in each country. We also organized a Global Forum of People’s Organizations on Hansen’s Disease in Indonesia.

At home, we came to appreciate more than ever the important role that nurses play in supporting the community. Fortunately, there have been no major natural disasters or difficult-to-manage infectious disease outbreaks since the Noto Peninsula earthquake in January 2024 and the torrential rain-related disasters in September of the same year. However, FY2025 was a year in which we had to consider a nationwide approach to address the ongoing trends of a rapidly aging population, a declining birthrate and depopulation. Once again, we were reminded that the true value of our efforts to protect the health and dignity of people in the communities where they have lived for a long time is being tested. We face increasingly complex challenges that cannot be addressed by simple measures.

The Nippon Foundation Home-Care Nursing Entrepreneur Training Program has resumed. Over 120 people have now completed the eight-month program and there are about 150 offices and more than 200 projects. However, 16 prefectures—many of them facing serious aging and depopulation issues—don’t yet have offices and we recognize that nursing expertise is becoming more important than ever.

Based on the activities of the entrepreneurs’ network, we continue to provide research grants and field training to university students and graduate students majoring in healthcare. We are also making steady progress with the Sasakawa Nursing Fellow Program and Scholarship, which aims to create leaders in society with experience of diversity and internationalism through masters and doctoral degrees in the United States and Canada.

The world continues to be divided and destabilized. At Sasakawa Health Foundation, it was a year in which we revisited the ideals of our founder, Ryoichi Sasakawa. Over 100 years ago, he encapsulated the idea of “leave no one behind” in the words: “The world is one family. All humankind are brothers and sisters.” Despite complex challenges such as war, infectious diseases, climate change and demographic shifts, we resolutely carried out activities based on primary healthcare.

With the support and guidance of everyone we share these complex times with, and in collaboration with the WHO, and through other international initiatives, we will continue to provide solid support to the communities close to each of us through activities such as human resources development.

Global Appeal 2026 to End Stigma and Discrimination against Persons Affected by Leprosy

On January 29, 2026, Global Appeal 2026 was launched in Brussels, Belgium. Co-hosted with Educational International, the appeal delivered a call to eliminate stigma and discrimination against persons affected by leprosy and realize an inclusive society through the transformative power of education. About 80 people, mainly from the fields of education and leprosy, took part in the launch ceremony and seminar. Guided by the principle of “leave no one behind” they emphasized the importance of solidarity and cooperation. In the morning, a delegation that included persons affected by leprosy had an audience with the Belgian Queen.

History of Leprosy Website Renewed

For the first time in 10 years, we completely revamped our leprosy history website. In addition to searching for materials by country and period, users can now systematically view and search for artworks, testimonies and related materials. Looking ahead, our goal is to collect memories and records related to leprosy and create an international online network to preserve and share them.

Achievements

International Workshop for Young Leaders of Persons Affected by Leprosy

In February 2026, the first international workshop of the “Young Scholar Program,” a capacity-building initiative designed to empower young people affected by leprosy and develop future community leaders, was held in Makassar, Indonesia. Approximately 40 scholars, mentors and other participants took part in the program. Through activity reports and field visits, the scholars learned about building a society free from stigma and discrimination, while strengthening solidarity through their interactions.

3rd Global Forum of People's Organizations on Hansen's Disease

In July 2025, the 3rd Global Forum of People's Organizations on Hansen's Disease took place in Bali, Indonesia, with over 120 persons affected by leprosy from 25 countries participating. The outcomes of the discussions were collated and presented at the opening ceremony of the 22nd International Leprosy Congress. In addition, an advisory committee composed of persons affected by leprosy was established to monitor the implementation of the recommendations on an ongoing basis.



3rd Global Forum of People's Organizations on Hansen's Disease (July 2025, Indonesia)

Collaboration with Governments to Support National Conferences Aimed at Eliminating Leprosy

To focus attention on leprosy, we reached out to governments, health ministries and other relevant organizations to support the holding of national conferences in priority countries. In May 2025, a national conference was held in Kathmandu, Nepal, at which the prime minister and the minister of health pledged to strengthen efforts against leprosy. In November 2025, at a conference in Colombo, Sri Lanka, attended by the president, a roadmap to achieve the WHO's goal of eliminating transmission of the disease by 2035 was presented. And in March 2026, we supported a national conference in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, attended by the ministers of health and human rights and citizenship, to help strengthen international cooperation to eliminate Hansen's disease.

Report on Operation, Public Awareness and Outreach Activities for National Hansen’s Disease Museum and Related Facilities (Project Commissioned by Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare)

In addition to managing and operating the National Hansen’s Disease Museum and the Jyu-Kanbo Museum, organizing symposiums and creating educational materials, we have also undertaken new projects starting this fiscal year. These include providing grants to sanatorium residents’ associations and others for awareness-raising activities, as well as grants to local governments to promote measures addressing the Hansen’s disease issue. Our goal is to foster a correct understanding of the issue.

About the Jyu-Kanbo Museum

The Jyu-Kanbo was a punishment block for leprosy patients formerly located in the grounds of National Sanatorium Kuryu Rakusen in Kusatsu Town, Gunma Prefecture. It was officially called a “Special Ward”, but it was a ward in name only. It was not used for treatment; its purpose was incarceration and punishment. The Jyu-Kanbo Museum collects and preserves materials related to the Jyu-Kanbo and Hansen’s disease, and presents the results of studies and research with the aim of promoting a broad understanding of Hansen’s disease and eliminating the stigma and discrimination associated with it. In addition to exhibition rooms featuring life-size replicas of the Jyu-Kanbo cells and displays of excavated artifacts, various events are held throughout the year.

Walking Tours

Four walking tours were held titled “A First History of Hansen’s Disease—Another Side of Kusatsu Hot Spring.” Led by volunteer guides, participants explored historical sites and facilities related to Hansen’s disease scattered throughout Kusatsu Town, Gunma Prefecture, which is closely linked to the history of the disease. A total of 27 people took part.

Related Activities
Residential Study Workshop at National Sanatorium Nagashima Aiseien

From August 26 to 28, participants stayed at the Mutsumi Exchange Center, a residential training facility at Nagashima Aiseien. Over three days, they considered what an inclusive society should look like, using the issue of Hansen’s disease as a starting point. They held discussions with Aiseien residents, carried out on-site field work and attended workshops. Fourteen undergraduate and graduate students from across the country took part, regardless of their major or field of study.

The Nippon Foundation Home-Care Nursing Center Entrepreneur Training Program Resumes

The eight-month Home-Care Nursing Center Entrepreneur Training Program, which had been suspended due to the COVID-19 pandemic, has resumed. Eight participants making up the tenth cohort drew up their business plans while studying together. On completing their training, they each began taking steps toward opening a home-care nursing center. With the tenth cohort having completed their training, the number of graduates from this program, which began in 2014, has reached 124.

10th Kantaki and Other New Office Openings Continue

The Foundation provides financial support for graduates of the entrepreneur training program to start or expand their own businesses. In FY2025, graduates from the ninth and tenth cohorts successively established home-care nursing centers. In addition, with the support of the Foundation, the ninth and tenth small-scale, multifunction home-care service centers (“Kantaki”) opened in Miyazaki and Yamaguchi prefectures in March and April 2026, respectively.

Raising the Issue of the Challenges Facing Children with Special Medical Needs and Their Families

With the goal of making the boat race course a place open to the community, the Marugame Boat Race Course in Kagawa Prefecture invited children with special medical needs and their families to Mooovi Marugame, a play space for local children. Mooovi is usually open to all children, but on that day, it was open exclusively to those with special medical needs, and the children could play safely under the supervision of nurses.

Meanwhile, at the Asia Philanthropy Congress hosted by The Nippon Foundation, a talk session was held featuring nurse entrepreneurs from the Home-Care Nursing Center Network who provide nursing care to children. The session addressed the challenges related to children with special medical needs, and the potential of home-care nursing.

Providing Opportunities for Continuous Learning

Sasakawa Health Foundation provides members and staff of The Nippon Foundation Home-Care Nursing Center Network with opportunities to continue learning and broaden their expertise and horizons while working. In FY2025, in addition to our customary twice-yearly overseas study programs, we began financial support for members and staff of the above network to enroll at the newly established, fully online ZEN University, aiming to support their further learning including liberal arts studies.

We organized an online public lecture series titled “Home-Care and Nursing”, at which doctors, nurses and welfare experts familiar with home care explained the realities of home-care nursing and the future of community-based integrated care. More than 1,300 people participated, mainly healthcare professionals.

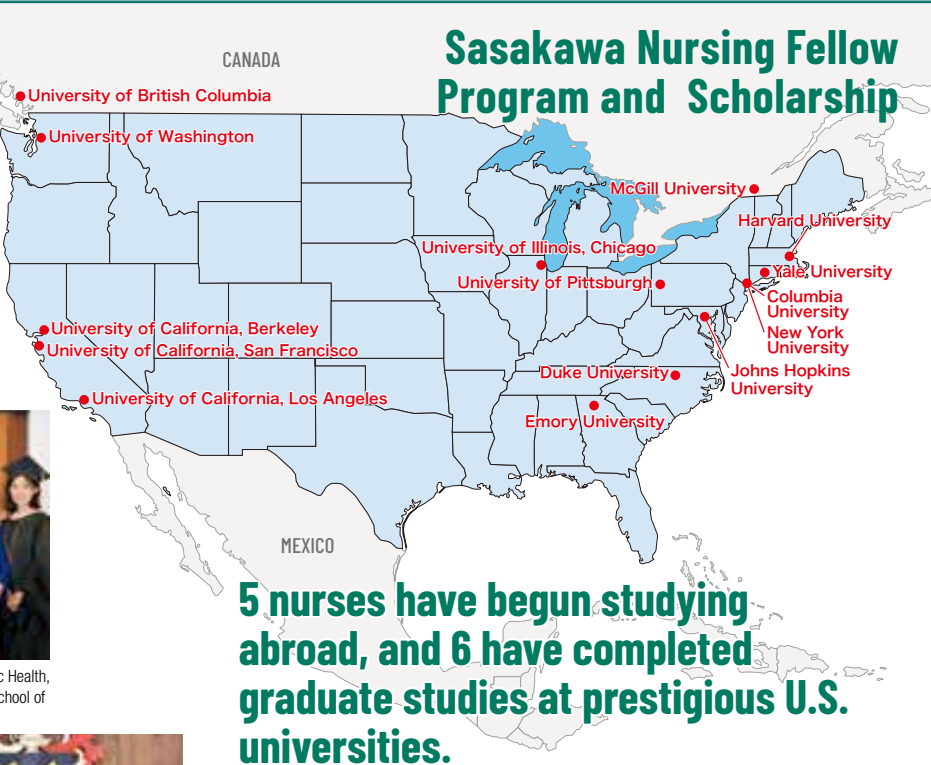
Diverse Research Projects Aiming to Promote Community Health

We have selected and funded research projects rooted in local communities. These projects cover areas such as home-based nursing care, community-based integrated care, care for cancer patients and seniors, disparities in access to medical care and support for those affected by these disparities. Numerous practical research projects were selected for funding. These projects were primarily led by nursing professionals and utilized multidisciplinary collaboration as well as information and communication technology (ICT), geographic information systems (GIS) and other tools. Wide-ranging research aimed at solving on-the-ground challenges and improving community well-being was carried out.

Sasakawa Nursing Fellow Program and Scholarship



5 nurses have begun studying abroad, and 6 have completed graduate studies at prestigious U.S. universities.

In FY2025, the Sasakawa Nursing Fellow Program and Scholarship—a scholarship program for nurses pursuing graduate studies abroad—sent five new fellows to study overseas. In addition, six fellows earned their degrees and have taken up positions with the government, research institutes, a UN agency and other organizations.

Sasakawa Mirai Juku Kyushu Study Tour

In FY2025, we held a five-day summer study tour titled “Thinking About Health and Human Security” in Nagasaki, the birthplace of modern medicine in Japan. The tour was intended for undergraduate and graduate students majoring in healthcare. Twenty students from around Japan visited Goto Island and Nagasaki City in Nagasaki Prefecture, and attended lectures and carried out fieldwork under the theme: “The Future of Health, Medical Care and Welfare—Connecting the Local Community and the World.”

WHO Sasakawa Health Prize

In FY2025, the 41st WHO Sasakawa Health Prize was presented to Dr. Merete Nordentoft of Denmark in recognition of her groundbreaking work on youth suicide prevention. This was the first time that the prize had been awarded in the field of mental health. It is hoped that interventions to prevent suicide among young people will contribute to primary healthcare in the future.

Medical Cooperation with Madagascar for Cleft Lips and Palates

In September 2025, we provided medical treatment for cleft lips and palates in Madagascar. Treatment was overseen by the Japan Madagascar Cleft Lip and Palate Medical Association (Representative: Yasuyoshi Tosa) and consisted of labial rhinoplasty, palatal surgery and secondary cleft-lip revision. Eight operations were performed in total. Post-operative follow-up was shared with local healthcare professionals, contributing to improvements in local medical technology and patients’ quality of life.

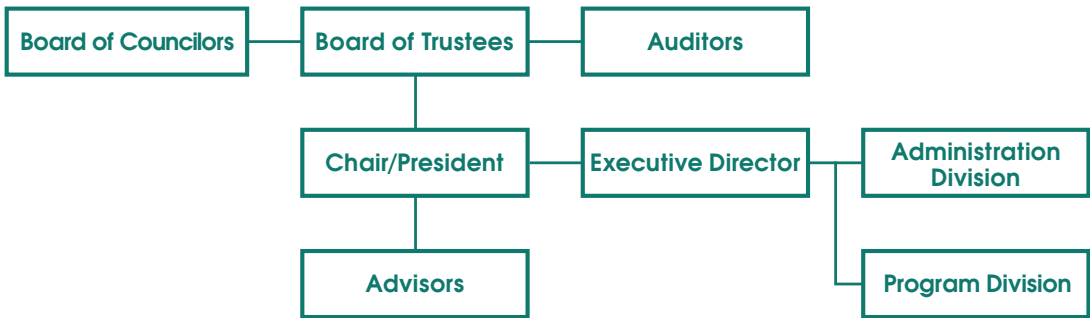
